At The John Hampden School Wendover we try hard to present the content as a linked curriculum whenever possible. This means we choose topics which enable aspects of different subjects to be taught in a meaningful way to the children. So, rather than having a history lesson each week we may choose to block the teaching of this subject into a specific topic. For Year 2 this half term has seen a focus on The



Great Fire of London. The history theme lends itself well to the requirement for children to be able to write a recount in English and to produce 3D art work so these things have been linked together. This week their teachers planned an exciting History Day for them and you can read more about it in the Curriculum Section of this newsletter.


At other times we may choose to have specific enrichment days or weeks to focus attention on a particular subject or a particular theme. So far this academic year we have enjoyed a fortnight of Health and Safety. At the end of this half term Miss Webb and Mrs Collins have planned an exciting Arts Week which is a new venture that will involve the children creating 3D art structures based on a mythical creatures theme. This will be enhanced with music, drama and poetry. Later on in the year there will be Enterprise Week, Science Investigation Day and World Weeks to look forward to.

Yesterday the whole school took part in Maths Day which was organised by our Maths Co-ordinator, Mrs Timms. Further details and comments from the pupils can be found in the Children's Section of this newsletter.

We have found that some topics are universally popular with infant aged pupils whilst at other times we take account of particular interests of the children to plan something new. Our teachers work very hard to keep the learning opportunities relevant and interesting for the children so they are motivated and engaged in their learning.

Whenever possible we invite visitors into school or we plan trips to enhance the learning experience. Sometimes we ask the children to come to school wearing

costumes to make their learning more memorable. With this in mind I would like to draw your attention to World Book Day which we will be celebrating on Friday 3rd March. Every year we ask the children to dress up as a character from one of their favourite books. We will be celebrating our love of books by providing a range of activities throughout the day including sharing books with Wendover Junior children.



2. GOVERNOR SECTION

Governor visit report for 26th January 2017

Yesterday was Maths Day, an event which I had heard about for the past few years when my son was at JHS, he always came home telling me of the fun things they had done that day - which, as a parent you will know, it's quite rare to hear about anything they do!

I was invited to visit different classrooms throughout the morning to see what they were doing. Having been in the school a number of times before it was clear that Maths Day was different, that the school was a bit buzzier and there was a feeling of excitement - both for the staff and children.

In the Hall the Year 1 and 2 classes each got a chance to meet the Maths in a Suitcase man. He comes in each year for Maths Day and has a variety of activities and games for the children. The Year 2 children remembered him from last year and while he was giving them an introduction they were sitting right on the edge of the benches desperate to get up and have a go. I was not surprised when I had a chance to play with some of the games, they were fun, creative and not what I remember from maths at school!

In Year 1, each teacher had an activity and the children got to spend time in all 3 classrooms. In Hedgehogs it was Maths Games, in Badgers it was number line sock puppets and in Squirrels it was outdoor maths. The Maths Games were set up with a variety of activities and the children could choose for themselves. There were learning aids such as number lines and whiteboards for those who needed extra support and whilst the teachers were there to help I was impressed how well they worked independently.

Foundation Stage had suffered from an Alien Invasion the previous night so they were tasked with figuring out who the Alien Invaders were and tidying up their mess. The excitement was obvious when I walked in and got told "there are pants in here!" I was very impressed with the level at which Foundation Stage were working - they were able to tell me about 2D (flat) and 3D (fat) shapes and describe them to each other in a guessing game. They worked with blocks to measure the length of the Aliens footprints and were writing the results on a whiteboard, built 3D rockets and had to work out which numbers the Aliens had stolen in sums. It reminded me that Maths doesn't have to be boring and almost anything can be used as a Maths resource.

Having been a parent at JHS for 4 years and now a Governor I have heard lots of mention of the schools values but it was really evident today how much the children thrive on them and really understand what they mean. I saw great examples of perseverance, collaboration and independence throughout the day and, yes, they really were "Loving to Learn"!!

School Times

This is a polite reminder that children should arrive at school between 8.45a.m. and 8.55a.m. each day. We have a number of children who are either arriving very early or after 8.55a.m. It is a shame that those children arriving late are often missing the important first instructions of the morning. Please try to ensure your child arrives on time. The black security gate is locked promptly at 8.55am so if your child is late please accompany them to the main entrance where we will let them into the school and ask you to complete the late arrivals sheet.

It really helps if bicycles and scooters are clearly named and we are happy for them to be padlocked to the fence for extra security if you wish. Siblings from Wendover Junior School should not leave their scooters or bikes on our premises.

Scroll of Honour Badges

Our behaviour initiative, which allows any pupil in the school to be nominated by an adult for demonstrating excellent behaviour, appears to be working well. Every child who is nominated has their name included on the Scroll of Honour and is asked to stand up in front of the rest of the school during Merit Assembly on Friday. They are given a yellow 'Spotted for Something Special' badge which they can wear for one week. We are asking for your support in ensuring the badges are returned to school on the following Thursday. This way we can make sure they can be passed to the next set of children who are nominated. More maths days. I love maths—Evie (Herons)


I've enjoyed everything on maths day—Jamie (Herons)

6. Curriculum

History came alive for Year 2 this Tuesday, 24th January when they all stepped back in time and took part in the events of The Great Fire of London from 1666 as part of their 'History Day'. The children were asked to come to school in Tudor costume and they all looked fantastic in a variety of attires from King Charles II, maids, Samuel Pepys, bakers, and chimney sweeps. Each class experienced historical events such as baking bread, hot seating, re-enacting scenes through drama and creating a colourful poster to record the main events. The feedback from adults and children was very positive.

Activity 1: Drama

The children entered the room and were given an old fashioned name and they chose their own occupation from a selection that were common at the time. They went on to imagine what it would have been like to wake to find the fire raging. They had to try to escape their homes before trying to put out the fire with squirts, pull down the buildings with hooks and escape via the river.







Activity 2: Hot seating and confirming known facts about the fire. Children took the role of different characters who were prominent at the time. The others then asked them questions to establish the facts about the fire from their perspective.

7. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

We aim to keep you fully informed of our actions linked to the school improvement plan. Since the last newsletter we have:-

GOAL A: LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

The leadership team at the school are committed to working collaboratively with others for the benefit of the children at John Hampden. The Governing Body are proactively seeking more information regarding the Multi-Academy Trust agenda which continues to be an area requiring our attention. We already work very closely with our Liaison Group of schools and we are, as a team, working together to ensure our governing bodies have all the information they require to be able to make an informed decision about the future direction of our schools.

Steph Parkinson has, once again, joined the team of EYFS County moderators. She will be visiting a number of other schools in the area to moderate their judgements linked to the EYFS profile to ensure consistency across Buckinghamshire.

GOAL B: TEACHING, LEARNING & ASSESSMENT

School trips and exciting enrichment activities in the last two weeks have helped to make the learning come alive for children in all year groups.

The assessment week data from before the Christmas holiday has been entered onto the tracking sheets and individual teachers have planned future teaching and individual/small group interventions for any child/group who is not on track to make expected progress during the year. We have a focus on making sure our most able children are appropriately challenged and the introduction of 'Challenge Lights' to our marking and feedback policy enables children to indicate how challenging they found the work that was offered to them.

GOAL C: PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, BEHAVIOUR & WELFARE

Parents recently received a letter informing them of their child's attendance figure for Autumn 2016. Analysis of whole school data tells us that 91 children (32%) had 100% attendance and 98% of children had an attendance percentage of over 80%. 81% had above 95% attendance (the expected figure) Punctuality data was also analysed. As a rule punctuality is very good but we do have a small number of families who are regularly arriving later then 8.55am. We will continue to monitor attendance and punctuality regularly.

We have introduced a new set of lunchtime monitors who are responsible for ensuring all children have someone they recognise who can help and support them at this time of the day. Our monitors wear special tabards so they can be easily identified and their photos are proudly displayed in the corridor. We are keen to ensure our pupils are given these types of roles of responsibility and there are further opportunities being planned including the introduction of a School Council to work alongside the current Class Council arrangement.

GOAL D: PUPIL OUTCOMES

Following the assessment week at the end of the Autumn Term pupil attainment has been entered onto our school tracking system. For key stage 1 pupils this has allowed us to measure progress since the end of Foundation Stage or the end of Year 1. End of year targets are then set and teaching and interventions are planned to meet the learning needs of all.

8. MISCELLANEOUS


Ollie's New Year Raffle
