1. Message from Mrs Barnes

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I wanted to start this newsletter by letting you know how proud we are of the children for engaging so enthusiastically in their learning during 'World Weeks'. It is incredible that the children and staff are able to display an incredible amount of learning and artefacts following just nine days of work—but the results are stunning and we hope you will enjoy the opportunity to come into school and look at all the interesting activities during our Open Evening in July. In the meantime you will soon find photos in the news section of the website.

I am beginning to spot prominent displays of school uniform in some shops and supermarkets so it must be time to start thinking about the new school year! Office staff spend quite a lot of time selling uniform on an adhoc basis so this year we have, once again, decided to set up a stall in the hall during the planned Open Evening on Thursday 12th July. We hope that any parents wishing to buy or order uniform for the next academic year will use this opportunity to purchase all they need. Whether it is a new reading folder, P.E. kit, one of our water bottles, or a complete set of new uniform—we hope to have enough stock for you to be prepared for the Autumn Term. We may also have a small table of second hand uniform available.

In the next two weeks I will provide you with details about classes and staff changes for the academic year 2018-2019, prior to the start of our transition programme which runs from 2nd July. There are a number of staffing changes but full details of these will be in the next newsletter. We will soon be sending home a survey to complete with your child about their interests, influences and role models outside school—please do send your completed form back in so it can be passed to their next class teacher. (EY, FS and Y1 only)

Parents of children in Foundation Stage should note that we intend to hold a brief meeting at 2.30pm on Friday 29th June where we will introduce the Year 1 staff and provide information regarding transition into Key Stage 1. For parents who are unable to attend a follow up letter will be issued that day.

2. GOVERNOR SECTION

'Bespoke to All'-Pupil Premium Funding

One of the main roles of the Governing body is to approve and oversee the annual school budget. As both the chairman of the finance committee, and the pupil premium governor, I have a particular interest in the school's finances. I am always looking to ensure that our funding is wisely spent, and to the maximum benefit of the pupils, whilst maintaining the freedom for our staff to deliver the curriculum in an exciting and engaging way.

The new school funding formula – a step forwards or sidewards?

Despite the introduction of the new school funding formula, school funding is still in crisis, reeling from the real-terms cuts estimated at 8.8 per cent since April 2015. All schools need significant increases in funding. The education budget is just not keeping up with massive increases in costs. Consequently, the funding of our school remains incredibly tight. This is true of all schools funded by the Government, and indeed all Government departments. Our income is allocated to us by the local authority, and is based on pupil numbers. Therefore we have no opportunity to increase our budget share.

What is Pupil Premium Funding?

A critical area of additional income for many schools is that of 'Pupil Premium'. Pupil Premium is additional funding the Government gives to schools to help children from either lower income or Service families to do their very best in the difficult circumstances they sometimes face. The Government also provides schools with a Sports Premium grant, again based on pupil numbers.

For every child registered as a 'Disadvantaged' pupil at John Hampden School, the school receives a minimum of £1320 per year, which could be used to provide additional learning support, extra-curricular opportunities and/or additional resources for the qualifying child.

Service Pupil Premium recognises the specific challenges children from Service families face and as part of the commitment to delivering the armed forces covenant. It is currently worth £300 per year for each Service child.

Sports premium funding is allocated to schools to increase pupil participation in sports and physical activities, to help staff run sports clubs and activities, and to promote physical and emotional wellbeing.

It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium funding is spent, since teachers are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility.

How does our school use Pupil Premium Funding?

I meet each term with the Pupil Premium teaching lead, Mrs Jo Spencer, to discuss how the pupil premium funding is being used, and report back my findings to the governing board. I am pleased to assure you that at our school the different types of pupil premium funding are extremely well spent, directly benefiting all the pupils and making a real difference to their educational experience at school.

Using the Service Pupil Premium funding we are fortunate to have hired the services of Helen Brettell to provide specialist pastoral care. Whilst this is extremely important to our Service children, the school also encourages any child who would benefit from Helen's services to meet with her. We actively encourage both parents and pupils to benefit from the pastoral care that Helen is able to provide, irrespective of whether the child is a Service pupil or not. Additionally, and topical as we head to the end of the Summer term, Helen works closely with year 2 pupils to make the transition to their next school as worry free as possible. From the autumn term, Helen will be in our school all day every Monday to increase the amount of time she can spend with our pupils.

The use of Premier Sport to support our teachers in providing school PE activities and out of school clubs is well publicised. Other initiatives the school runs are less well known about. One of several areas where we have invested our Sport Premium funding is in the area mindfulness, self-esteem and resilience, where we look to help pupils become confident and emotionally resilient. For example, amongst other initiatives in this area the school has made Yoga available to pupils. However, this support is not just limited to pupils. The school is working with the 'Nurturing Minds' consultancy group to extend the benefit of this funding to parents who would like to better understand their child's behaviour, and would like access to the experienced team of psychologists they employ. We will shortly be running a series of voluntary sessions where parents can benefit from better understanding areas such as mindfulness, self-esteem, behaviour management and social skills. Evidence suggests that if these areas of a child's personality are well understood and cared for, then they will do better in their educational setting as a result.

Why is this important?

These are just a couple of examples of how the school uses the pupil premium grants it is allocated. Like the other governors, I spend a lot of time at the school and over the last 2 years I have observed that we don't 'bang the drum' enough about our many strengths. Our use of pupil premium funding, for the direct benefit of each and every pupil, is one such strength of the school. In the face of some pretty severe financial challenges, that we are powerless to influence, the school continues to use these additional grants to ensure that our children have the best quality of education possible, and to help promote their emotional and social wellbeing. The senior leadership team is passionate about providing the very highest level of education and support to the children. Far from being aimed at specific pupils, this extraordinary level of support is 'bespoke to all', and helps contribute to making the John Hampden School Wendover such an outstanding school.

2. FUNDRAISING UPDATE

Fundraising to support a stable, enriching learning environment

Dear Parents,

The summer term is well underway and we would like to take this opportunity to provide an update on our fundraising efforts, in the face of the funding deficit, to support a stable learning environment for all pupils.

Many parents have generously supported the John Hampden School Learning Trust with monthly and one-off donations through MyDonate. This has raised several thousand pounds, which alongside an extensive restructure and budgeting exercise undertaken by the school has ensured that no further cuts to resources and staffing were required.

For all your support and kind donations we offer a huge THANK YOU. It has really made a difference.

However, because of the incredibly challenging funding environment, the school remains in deficit and all the money received from Buckinghamshire County Council must be used for core running costs. This leaves little spare for the 'nice extras' that really help to enhance your child's school experience.

The PTA continues to do a marvellous job raising money through events, such as the May Fayre and Summer Barbeque, to provide enrichment activities and equipment – but there are still many resources that the school would dearly like to purchase to enhance learning.

Moving forward, we therefore propose to direct all donations received from parents through MyDonate to fund these 'enrichment resources' that range from art materials to IT programmes and playground equipment. From September we will outline the items we are raising funds for each term, and we will keep you updated on progress and purchases through the fortnightly school newsletters.

We hope that parents will welcome this shift in direction – it is something several of you have suggested - and we would very much welcome new donors to sign up to supporting the Learning Trust.

3. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

We aim to keep you fully informed of our actions linked to the school improvement plan. Since the last newsletter:-

GOAL A: LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

Many thanks to all the parents who have returned the annual questionnaire that I sent out with the last newsletter. There is still time to respond (deadline for returning completed questionnaires is Friday 6th July) and I would love to receive as many responses as possible. The information gathered will be collated and shared with the various stakeholders in the school. As well as asking parents for their views we also ask the pupils what they think too. Our Key Stage 1 pupils will be completing a learning questionnaire which aims to provide us with information on how well the pupils are taught and supported in their learning.

It is vital for us to regularly conduct these types of exercises in order to continue to develop the school.



GOAL B: QUALITY OF TEACHING

June is report writing time for teachers. At John Hampden we have designed an annual written report that aims to provide narrative comments giving clear information, personal to the child, about the pupil's progress over the whole academic year The report comments on general progress, behaviour and attitudes, and progress in all subjects and activities of the curriculum. It outlines the child's strengths and the areas they need to develop. FS, Y1 and Y2 parents receive summary data linked to statutory as-



sessment procedures. A summary of the child's attendance record - number of possible attendances and % of unauthorised absences is also included. Additionally, for KS₁ pupils we also include a sheet that is completed by the child indicating

their view on how well they meet the school values as well as identifying areas they have enjoyed or would like to improve in. This annual report is deliberately very thorough and for this reason we do not organise specific consultation meetings for parents in the summer term. You are, of course, welcome to make an appointment to see the teacher following the annual report if you feel it is necessary.

GOAL C: PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, BEHAV-**IOUR & WELFARE**

We recognise the importance of smooth transition from one class to the next and we have put in place manageable systems and procedures to TRANSITIONS ensure that as far as possible, there is timely transfer of information between teachers within the school and be-



tween schools. When a pupil leaves, we fulfil statutory requirements to send information to the receiving school; we also send on the child's educational record as legally required. We also work hard to support pupils in making successful transition from class to class within this school.

Therefore we ensure that teachers:

- Have opportunities to talk together before the pupils transfer
- Have clear understanding of colleagues' judgements based on secure moderation procedures
- Share information about pupils' progress as they move from one class to the next or to a new school in order to support continuity of learning for all pupils
- Make good use of the information received at cohort, class and subject level as well as to help determine the provision for groups and individuals

GOAL D: PUPIL OUTCOMES

The week commencing 11th June is Phonics Screening week. Since Monday, our Year 1 pupils (plus those Year 2 pupils who did not reach the standard last year) have all worked individually with their teachers to gauge their phonic knowledge using the check provided by the Government. We are cautiously optimistic that our results will be very pleasing. Whilst phonics is extremely useful in the early stages of reading we are now really seeing the impact of children using phonics to improve their spelling too. The weekly spelling tests are reinforcing phonic knowledge and we are grateful to those parents who are clearly supporting their children so well at home to consolidate these sound foundations for future learning.

SPORTS DAY 2018

Weather permitting, our Sports Day will take place on Friday 22nd June. We will continue with our traditional format this year which makes the event shorter, more competitive and more enjoyable for participants and spectators.

The event will take place on the Wendover Junior School field and each year group will participate at a different time.

Year 1 will commence at 9.15am
Foundation Stage will commence at 10.15am
Year 2 will commence at approximately 11.15am

At the appropriate time, spectators should arrive and enter John Hampden via the marked gate. Please follow the signs directing you to the field and we would ask you to ensure you take the marked route to avoid us disturbing the pupils and staff at the Junior School.

Spectators are welcome to bring chairs or rugs to sit on and we will ask you to position yourselves behind the markers beside the edge of the track. Pupils should come to school in normal school uniform. They will change in school and be brought to the track by their teaching staff at the appropriate time. Children should have sun cream applied before they come to school and they are welcome to bring a cap if it is very sunny. The staff will provide water for anyone who needs it. The activities for each year group will last for approximately one hour and during this time there will be the opportunity for mums, dads and younger siblings to join in to, so do come prepared!

We look forward to seeing you on Friday 22nd, but if the weather is bad we will postpone the event until Friday 29^{th} June. If, on either day, Sports Day has to be postponed I will put a message on the school website and the school gates by 8.30a.m. If there is no message you should assume the event is taking place so there will be no need to phone the school office.

MIDDAY SUPERVISOR JOB DESCRIPTION

MAIN DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

- 1. Preparation & Clearing Away
- · to prepare the dining room and associated areas for lunchtime use
- to tidy and clean the dining room and associated areas following lunchtime supervision in preparation for afternoon lessons in this area
- To distribute wrist bands to those children who have ordered a hot lunch
- 2. Organisation
- · to discuss, and follow, the agreed plans for organisation of the class at lunchtime
- to assist with the general management and organisation of children and resources/equipment which relate to the support of children at lunchtime
- to assist with the organisation and supervision of children during educational visits and outings, if required
- 3. Supervising Children
- to support individuals or groups of children as they eat
- · to assist with the supervision of pupils on the playground:
 - o within classroom/dining room settings
 - o using the cloakroom and toilets
 - o changing before and after lunchtime club activities(if necessary)
 - to assist children as appropriate
 - o with the attainment of personal hygiene skills
 - with the removal and replacement of clothing/footwear/toileting
 - o who require cleaning and/or changing following sickness, soiling etc.
- to guide and assist the development of children's personal and social development, attitudes and skills as appropriate
- to assist, as directed, with the implementation of specific interventions for individual children
- 4. Observation of Children
- to contribute to general observation and ongoing assessment of children, giving feedback to teaching staff
- 5. Care, Support and Guidance
- to administer minor support care/first aid as appropriate, report injuries to appropriate authorities within the school, enter details in accident book

- to ensure Safeguarding procedures are complied with at all times

6. Housekeeping
