2. GOVERNOR SECTION

When I was primary school age, my knowledge of the different parts of the world was formed by a single Spanish holiday, some TV programmes set in America, a computer program called 'Capitals of Europe' and trying to work out which page to stick stamps in to a Stanley Gibbons collectors album. Access to information has changed dramatically in the 20 (ish) years since I left primary school and teaching Geography has had to keep up with the times.

Geography is taught to the EYFS children as part of the Knowledge and Understanding of the World part of the curriculum and for KS1 children as part of focussed topics across a half term covering the Geography KS1 curriculum. The curriculum aims to ensure the children develop knowledge of physical and human geography and children are competent in collecting, analysing and communicating a range of data and interpreting a range of sources of geographical information. Geography teaching in the school responds to a diversity of culture, faith, ethnicities and family backgrounds.

Geography is also incorporated into a number of other subjects across the curriculum. Children enjoy writing about other parts of the world and are encouraged to use extended technical vocabulary in their descriptions. They will read a variety of texts to find out about different places and apply comprehension to draw inference and locate information. Geography in school also involves collecting numerical information, data processing and using computing skills and resources to locate, explore, analyse and present information in different ways.

Geography also has a very strong connection with Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural (SMSC) knowledge. John Hampden's children are encouraged to discuss and appreciate the beauty, scale and influence of geographical and natural phenomena on our environment. Human Geography covers aspects of social, cultural and moral understanding of the world through accepting and respecting diversity and how different communities and societies function. Geography leads to a sense of enjoyment and fascination in learning about themselves, others and the world around them.

My children have access to videos, images and information about parts of the world I didn't even know existed when I was their age. In many ways the world seems to have become a much smaller place with the amount of information available to our children. The high quality of Geography teaching in the school guides our children through this information and allows them to understand their place in the world.

3. IMPORTANT MESSAGES

SUN PROTECTION

As the warmer weather appears we are keen to see children wearing named sunhats. We have a stock of John Hampden caps available from the school office. Parents are reminded that they should apply their child's long lasting sun cream before school but, if there are special cases where the cream needs to be applied more frequently, parents should contact the class teacher to make suitable arrangements. We are fortunate to have many shady areas and we try to minimise the amount of time children are exposed to the sun. For health and safety reasons, children should always come to school wearing socks.

WATER BOTTLES

We encourage our pupils to bring a water bottle into school which can be stored on their table and accessed when necessary. Bottles must only contain water—no juice or squash as this can become very sticky and is attractive to ants!

LOST PROPERTY

Since the Easter break our lost property bins are already overflowing with un-named jumpers and cardigans as well as a range of other items of clothing that we are unable to return to their rightful owner. Please take time to name your child's clothes even if you just use a biro to write their name on the label.

HEAD LICE

We are aware that there are cases of head lice in our Year 2 classes. Please check your child's hair regularly and treat as necessary. It helps to prevent the spread of headlice if children with long hair have it tied back during the school day. Thank you for your support.

5. PUPIL'S SECTION

Our School Council held it's meeting on Tuesday this week. Mrs Spencer has been at the forefront of work to develop this team to ensure the pupil voice is heard and has an impact on school improvement. There is a display outside the school hall which features the work of the School Council but we thought you might like to read the minutes of their latest meeting.

The John Hampden School Council Minutes

Meeting held on: Tuesday 8th May 2018 at 10.15am

Present: All Class Representatives from FS, Years 1 & 2, Chloe (Chairperson), Evie (Minutes Secretary) Mrs Spencer (Facilitator)

- 1. Welcome Mrs Spencer welcomed all members to the School Council meeting
- 2. The School Council recited The John Hampden Ethos (Motto)
- 3. The School Council read the School Council Aims
- 4. Minutes from the last meeting were shared by Chloe and agreed by all
- 5. Mrs Spencer said that feedback from School Council about how pupils can help themselves to make better progress, was shared at a staff meeting as well as with all classes
- 6. Mrs Spencer reported that the School Council suggestion that classes who get 5 balls in a week for lining up at lunchtime should choose their own treat, has now been put in place
- 7. Evie asked the SC some questions to talk about:

Question 1 asked of the School Council – Life at John Hampden School – how is it going? What is working well? What could be done better?

- > Behaviour is good, we keep looking at the Golden Time Sun, Cloud & Rain cloud in our classrooms
- School Council suggested that children could help their friends to listen better
- > Behaviour on the playground is better. Friends are letting others join a game good manners
- > Some classes are lining up well although, a few children are spoiling it by not lining up nicely
- School Council asked if more could be done to help these children to line up better
- Behaviour on the football pitch has improved (since teachers spoke to classes about it)
- School Council considers that classes are working hard concentrating better

Question 2 asked of the School Council – What would you like to say during the school assembly next week, about the School Council and the building project?

- > We agreed on what we would say during the assembly
- > A power point was requested, to include photos of the SC visit to visit the building project
- It was agreed that we would share recent School Council decisions that have led to changes concerning
 how the school is run (including; kindness posters on the playground, how pupils can help themselves to
 make better progress, rewards for lining up at lunch time and sharing important views with a School Governor)
- > We will finish by answering questions that anybody would like to ask us

6. CURRICULUM

The Topic Guides for the new themes this half term have been put on the school website under the Classes Section. These are designed to give you an insight into what your children will be learning this half term and they also include some useful suggestions of how to support learning at home. This half-term the topics are:

Foundation Stage—'Stories from Around the World' Year 1— 'Living & Growing' Year 2 — 'In an English Country Garden'

GROWTH MINDSETS



The ethos of 'Loving to Learn' has been strong at John Hampden for many years and it was established following an Action Research project about metacognition completed by Mrs Barnes. Over the years we have designed our curriculum to include opportunities for children to learn to question (P4C) and to provide security for children to make mistakes safely and learn from them. Research that underpins this approach is based on the work of Dr.Carol Dweck. Over 30 years ago, she and her colleagues became interested in pupils' attitudes about failure. They noticed that some pupils rebounded while other pupils seemed devastated by even the smallest setbacks. After studying the behaviour of thousands of children, Dr. Dweck coined the terms fixed mindset and growth mindset to describe the underlying beliefs people have about learning and intelligence. When pupils believe they can get smarter, they understand that effort makes them stronger. Therefore they put in extra time and effort, and that leads to higher achievement. At John Hampden, we are constantly telling the children that effort leads to success and we have worked hard to provide a consistent approach to teaching about 'Growth Mindsets' across the school. Mrs King is leading the work and she has co-ordinated staff training which has led us to the point where we have introduced a consistent reference point in each classroom linked to the message that we reinforce regularly. You will be able to see a display linked to this as you enter the school.



7. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

We aim to keep you fully informed of our actions linked to the school improvement plan. Since the last newsletter we have:-

GOAL A: LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

Ensuring we get the best value for money is certainly on our minds as we look to see how we can make the necessary savings required to allow us to continue to provide a high quality education for the pupils at our school. The County Council's decision not to move us to four form entry from September 2018 means that the additional funding, which extra pupils would bring, is no longer available to us in the immediate future. To this end the Governors have looked closely at the budget situation and we are having regular visits from the Finance Team at Bucks County Council to try to gain the best advice as to how to move forwards. We hope to launch a new fundraising initiative in the near future. Please note that the current building project is fully funded by Bucks County Council. It is cost neutral to the school budget.

GOAL B: TEACHING, LEARNING & ASSESSMENT

At this time of the year our thoughts turn to the Phonics check which takes place in June. This check of our Year 1 pupils is designed to measure the success of the phonics teaching in the school. Under the expert leadership of Mrs Parkinson we have seen the standard improve each year and we are keen that this should continue. The daily teaching of phonics can be helpfully reinforced at home and we are pleased that so many parents are taking the time to do this with their children.

To this end we have offered phonics meetings for parents and we also provide ideas about how to help and support the development of phonics at home through the topic guides and through additional activities to complete at home, if necessary.

GOAL C: PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, BEHAVIOUR & WELFARE

The Pupil's Section in this newsletter provides evidence that we are working hard to make sure we are engaging pupils in the school improvement cycle and taking actions as a result of their feedback. Since returning from the Easter break week we have introduced a range of activities for the children to access at lunchtimes as a direct result of the School Council feedback. It has been lovely to watch groups of children collaborating successfully in games which give them the opportunity to play something different and new. Ensuring children are happy and occupied helps us to continue to improve personal development, behaviour and welfare. Staff well-being is also monitored annually and in the next few weeks the whole staff will be invited to complete a well-being survey. The results of this survey are analysed and compared to findings from previous years to help to maintain a happy and motivated workforce.

GOAL D: PUPIL OUTCOMES

Now is the time when so many of the statutory assessments are about to start. Last week at the staff meeting, teachers were asked to consider standards of presentation across the year groups and we were impressed to see the pleasing standards that children are attaining as they progress through the school. Writing assessment provides an interesting challenge for us and we are pleased to note significant successes in the way we have adapted to the relatively new system of assessment in this area. It is clear to see how strong teaching in Foundation Stage and Year 1 leads to the pleasing progress so many children are making as they near the end of their time in Year 2.


