# NEWSLETTER

# 1. Message from Mrs Barnes

Ensuring safety in and around the school is of paramount importance. This obviously involves making sure the school building and the school grounds are well maintained and secure but it also means naking sure the people in the school are working and behaving safely towards one another.

In terms of building and site security we conduct termly Health, Safety and Accessibility Inspections. The Local Authority also conduct a Health and Safety Audit every three years—ours happened on 5th May 2016. Last week we had an independent fire risk assessment carried out which will provide us with a list of recommendations—fortunately nothing too serious was identified. A playground inspection is planned for the Easter holiday and, now it is a year since building work was completed, the builders will be back in the next few weeks to complete any snagging. The findings of all these inspections and audits are fed back to the Premises, Health & Safety Committee of the Governing Board and, in this way, we are able to ensure that the school remains as safe as possible. This does not mean that accidents will not happen but it does mean we are taking all appropriate measures to ensure the risk of accidents is minimized.

We are currently reviewing security with regards to visitors to the school. We have recently purchased new badges for all staff members to wear and new lanyards which will be issued to all visitors and contractors. After signing in, anyone entering the school will now be asked to use one of the new anyards rather than the old badges. This new procedure has been explained to the children in assembly and they have been encouraged to look out to see that the adults in the school are following the new arrangements. Once the school gates are locked in the morning no-one will be able to enter the building without being issued with a lanyard. Children who arrive late, after the gates have been shut, will be directed to their classrooms by office staff.

This week we had another 'Keeping Safe' assembly to keep the anti-bullying message at the forefront of the children's minds. We discussed the importance of saying, 'No' if someone asks you to do something that makes you feel scared or uncomfortable and reinforced the message that true friends do not put you in difficult positions.

This week I have also conducted Behaviour and Safety interviews with representatives from each class. The findings will be used to direct the focus of the next Class Council Circle Time and this will be followed up by the new School Council who will aim to identify possible improvements they would like to see.

Health and Safety is everyone's responsibility and we are hoping that by engaging our pupils we will consider things from their perspective too.

As the end of term approaches we look forward to seeing as many of you as possible during our Enterprise Week activities, planned for the final week of term. This year each class has chosen their own fundraising idea and you will shortly be receiving an invitation to attend an event which has been planned by the children especially for you. We hope that our timings will allow parents with siblings in the school to spend some time with both classes.

# 2. GOVERNOR SECTION

The Governing Body are always willing to listen to parental queries and to explain in more detail what the Governing Body does. # **3. IMPORTANT MESSAGES**

# LEARNING REVIEW MEETINGS

Thank you for your feedback following the learning review meetings in early March. This information has been analysed and fed back to class teachers. At the end of this newsletter you can see the overall feedback percentages from all those who completed a questionnaire following their meeting. We are obviously very pleased with these findings but have also taken on board the verbal and written feedback that was provided. Keeping to time is clearly the biggest challenge for staff because if everyone has just one minute longer than their allotted time there will inevitably be a consequence for people with later appointments. We apologise if you had to wait beyond your appointment time.

## MEDICINES

This is a polite reminder that if your child requires prescribed medicine three times a day, this should be administered at home in the morning, after school and again in the evening. We are only expected to administer prescribed medicine that is due four times a day or if there are exceptional circumstances. Thank you for your co-operation.

# P.E KITS

During the Easter Holiday we would be grateful if you would check that your child has a complete P.E. kit including tracksuit bottoms and a sweatshirt for use outside when neces-

sary. Your child also needs to have a correctly fitting pair of P.E. shoes (preferably not laces unless they can tie them themselves!) All kit must be named. Children with long hair should have it tied back and anyone with earrings should have them removed at home or be provided with tape to cover them during P.E. sessions.

## BACK PACKS

This is a polite request that, wherever possible, children should not bring back packs to school. Our cloakrooms are not large and back packs tend to take up a lot of space meaning the space available is reduced and coats end up on the floor. Children are only required to bring a book bag to school and a lunchbox, if necessary.

## COATS

Even though we do appear to be enjoying some slightly warmer weather at the moment we do still need children to bring a coat to school each day. Thank you for your co-operation.

# SCIENCE INVESTIGATION DAY

On Thursday 9th March all the children in Years 1 and 2 had an exciting time being Investigative Scientists.

Year 1 had a problem to solve. A teddy was sad and wet as his roof was leaking. They had to make him a new roof. This involved testing a variety of different materials to see which ones were waterproof. The children had to carefully plan and carry out their own tests. They decided which materials to test, how to test them and made decisions about what equipment they would need.

The card was not a good roof. When we tipped the water on the cardboard, water sucked into it. The cardboard got soggy—Bailey-Jack (Badgers)

I enjoyed pouring the water onto the cups because we could see if we were right or wrong about the materials—Francesca (Badgers)

I really liked observing the different materials to see if they were waterproof or not—Evie (Hedgehogs) I learned that sometimes scientists need to allow extra time to check if the test has worked or not—Rosie (Hedgehogs)

I learned that some materials are waterproof and some are not. It was fun—Annie (Squirrels)

I enjoyed testing different materials to see if Teddy would get wet—Caelan (Squirrels)





Year 2 children investigated which materials would be the most effective to make a flying rocket or javelin from. The children had a selection of different materials such as wood, straws and card. They had to decide which to use for their flying creation and how to build it. They then tested their rockets and javelins to see if they were effective. They then tested them to see how far they could fly.

I enjoyed building my rocket—Jayden (Firecrests)

I loved all the different parts of the science day; planning, making and throwing the rockets—Torin (Firecrests)

I liked the challenge. Everyone had to fly the rocket with accurate speed and we had to find out whose went the furthest—Hannah (Firecrests)

It was tremendous and everyone worked hard to make a rocket with lots of science skills—James (Red Kites)

I liked watching which rocket went the furthest because it was exciting—Freya (Eagles)

I learnt different materials made the nose of my javelin stronger or weaker—Toby (Eagles)

I liked science because I loved seeing everybody's amazing creations—Hugo (Herons)

It was really fascinating to see which could shoot the furthest. It was really tricky because you didn't know if it was good enough to manage to go further than the rest and Kali's won—Freya (Herons)

Foundation Stage will become scientists this week. We look forward to hearing about their discoveries soon.

# 7. School Improvement

We aim to keep you fully informed of our actions linked to the school improvement plan. Since the last newsletter we have:-

#### **GOAL A: LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT**

Each teacher in the school takes responsibility for a specific curriculum area. During the term governors may come into school to observe a specific event linked to their subject area or they meet with the teacher to discuss how the subject is being taught, assessed or developed. At the end of each term subject leaders are required to review the actions they have taken during the term and the impact these actions have had. The governor section of the newsletter often provides an example of this in practice and it is clear that this type of liaison is mutually beneficial and also helps to maintain standards in the school.

Last week we received a visit from two members of the Early Years Team at Bucks Learning Trust. The Early Years Class was the focus of their visit and they spent the whole morning speaking to Mrs Parkinson (Deputy Head Teacher and EYFS Leader) and observing Mrs Griffiths, Mrs Redman and the children in the class. Initial feedback was extremely positive and we look forward to receiving their full report in due course.

#### GOAL B: TEACHING, LEARNING & ASSESSMENT

It has been really encouraging to see how well our pupils are responding to the different themes and topics that have been introduced during the year. We have worked hard to try to cover numerous curriculum areas within a topic and the quality of learning appears to have improved considerably as a result. We are very aware that the teaching and learning environment contributes enormously to effective learning and we are working hard to ensure our outside learning areas reflect a similar high quality to that provided indoors. The EYFS curriculum and the National Curriculum guide the content of the taught curriculum but the spiritual, moral, social and cultural aspects of learning also feature strongly in the curriculum to reinforce the ethos of our school.

## GOAL C: PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, BEHAVIOUR & WELFARE

Mrs Spencer line manages the Midday Meals Supervisors at the school. Each half term she meets with them to discuss issues arising and to provide them with the necessary information and training they require to fulfil their roles. Last week they completed a questionnaire about the current lunchtime arrangements. This was a follow up to the new arrangements for hot meals that were introduced in January. We are delighted that their feedback has been, on the whole, very positive and we shall take on board some of their suggestions for further improvements.

#### **GOAL D: PUPIL OUTCOMES**

This week we have confirmed arrangements for Assessment Point 4 which concludes at the end of the Spring Term. Tracking pupil progress is a necessary part of monitoring in the school. Each term, following Assessment Weeks, staff give a summative assessment level for each pupil in reading, writing and mathematics. This information is used to track progress from one term to the next. It is then possible for us to identify those children who are making below, expected or above expected progress. For any child that has not made expected progress, teachers are required to identify actions they will take to address any concerns. This careful tracking of pupil progress helps us to maintain the high standards of achievement we have come to expect at John Hampden.






