2. GOVERNOR SECTION

If you are a regular reader of the Governor Section of the John Hampden Newsletter you could be forgiven for thinking that the job is almost solely concerned with rules, regulations and statistics.

Although some of the work is concerned with these essential if un-glamourous areas of education we also get the privilege of seeing JH pupils not just in Nativity plays or at sports days but also in their everyday school activities which is always fascinating.

Occasionally outside providers come into School, as they do for Health and Safety fortnight, which adds another dimension to the pupils' education but towards the end of last Term I sat in on something which was a completely new departure for our Year One children. The History Co-ordinator Mrs Sarah McNally had wanted to re-introduce 'Toys' as a discrete History topic for some time as this would be an appealing and relevant way into History as an academic discipline. Because of the positive experience of other schools, an external provider came to JH for two days to give the children an insight into the history of toys as well as lots of cross-curricular and hands on experience.

On the first day the children had learnt the history of toys and how some had even been found in the tombs of ancient Egypt. This was very much a hands-on experience and they got to play with some genuinely old toys as well as faithful facsimiles.

When I arrived, the children were busy making and colouring their own copies of Victorian action toys. Rather to my surprise the children were also learning how to use drills and hammers to assemble them. Every child was interested and very focused on these tasks. Gravity and balance were also explained and demonstrated with some of the toys. Despite the air of suppressed excitement as each child's toy slowly neared completion their behaviour was exemplary, there were even cries of disappointment when it was break time.

Eventually every toy was finished, played with, explained to neighbours and then exchanged. Each child treated both their own and their friend's toy with respect. Some of the toys like the climbing monkey, figures striking an anvil and pecking chickens must date back several hundred years and use the most basic materials, and perhaps it was partly the clarity of how they worked which appealed to the children so much.

In these difficult times, the only way JH can fund such an expensive experience for our pupils is through your voluntary contributions. If you wonder if these are really worthwhile, I suggest you ask any Year One pupil, or their parents, that question.

3. IMPORTANT MESSAGES

SUN PROTECTION

Hopefully warmer weather is just around the corner! In the event, we are keen to see children wearing named sunhats. We have a stock of John Hampden caps available from the school office. Parents are reminded that they should apply their child's long lasting sun cream before school but, if there are special cases where the cream needs to be applied more frequently, parents should contact the class teacher to make suitable arrangements. We are fortunate to have many shady areas and we try to minimise the amount of time children are exposed to the sun.

For health and safety reasons, children should always come to school wearing socks.

WATER BOTTLES

We encourage our pupils to bring a water bottle into school which can be stored on their table and accessed when necessary. Bottles must only contain water—no juice or squash as this can become very sticky and is attractive to ants!

LOST PROPERTY

4. Curriculum

The Topic Guides for the new themes this half term have been put on the school website under the Classes Section. GROWTH MINDSETS



The ethos of 'Loving to Learn' has been strong at John Hampden for many years and it was established following an Action Research project about metacognition completed by Mrs Barnes. Over the years we have designed our curriculum to include opportunities for children to learn to question (P4C) and to provide security for children to make mistakes safely and learn from them. Research that underpins this approach is based on the work of Dr.Carol Dweck. Over 30 years ago, she and her colleagues became interested in pupils' attitudes about failure. They noticed that some pupils rebounded while other pupils seemed devastated by even the smallest setbacks. After studying the behaviour of thousands of children, Dr. Dweck coined the terms fixed mindset and growth mindset to describe the underlying beliefs people have about learning and intelligence. When pupils believe they can get smarter, they understand that effort makes them stronger. Therefore they put in extra time and effort, and that leads to higher achievement. At John Hampden, we are constantly telling the children that effort leads to success and we have worked hard to provide a consistent approach to teaching about 'Growth Mindsets' across the school.

Mrs King is leading the work and she has co-ordinated staff training which has led us to the point where we have introduced a consistent reference point in each classroom linked to the message that we reinforce regularly. You will be able to see a display linked to this as you enter the school.

SCHOOL TRAVEL

Walk to school Week Challenge – 20th May – 24th May 2019



I am organising a five day walking challenge for the week of the 20th May – 24th May. Your child will receive a challenge pack provided by the charity 'Living Streets' to complete each day. There are many fun activities to do each day and prizes and stickers to be won. Remember, if you have to drive to or from school perhaps you could challenge yourselves to park away from the school campus and walk part of the way (Park and Stride) or park at a friend's house and walk from there. Your child can still also scoot or cycle to take part in the challenge. At the end of the week please hand the challenge sheet to the class teacher, with your child's name and class clearly written on it, to have the chance of winning a prize (one prize being a cuddly Strider, our WOW mascot). The children will also receive a sticker for every day of the challenge they manage to complete. Thank you all for your continued support for our safer routes to school initiatives.

Year 2 Cycle Training

It is pleasing to report that the Y2 cycle training is well under way again this summer term. For many years now a qualified cycle instructor, Mr Chris German, has come into school to teach the children a basic understanding of how to ride a bicycle safely in an off road situation. The training takes place after school and is based on developing good cycle control skills and cycle safety awareness. I have the pleasure of assisting Mr German each week and I am so proud of the children and the development they make over the three week course. I am thrilled to see the children apply our Golden Rules and school values to their training. The children certainly persevere with the skills taught and show excellent listening skills, making the most of the hour long session.

Some of the skills taught include a bike safety check, ABC – air, brakes and chain, before they start to ride their bikes, emergency stops, signalling, and many more real life situations. The sessions always end in a bike race, with the children riding their bikes as slowly as possible, showing control and balancing skills, the last person over the line is the winner!! This is very popular and the improve-

ment each week is a pleasure to see.

7. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

We aim to keep you fully informed of our actions linked to the school improvement plan. Since the last newsletter we have made progress linked to the actions outlined below:

GOAL A: LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

Ensuring we get the best value for money is certainly on our minds as we look to see how we can make the necessary savings required to allow us to continue to provide a high quality education for the pupils at our school. The County Council's decision not to move us to four form entry from September 2019 means that the additional funding, which extra pupils would bring, is no longer available to us in the immediate future. To this end the Governors have looked closely at the budget situation and we are having regular visits from the Finance Team at Bucks County Council to try to gain the best advice as to how to move forwards. We hope to provide you with a further update regarding how your fundraising is being used in the near future. Please note that the recently completed building project is fully funded by Bucks County Council. It is cost neutral to the school budget.



GOAL B: TEACHING, LEARNING & ASSESSMENT

At this time of the year our thoughts turn to the Phonics check which takes place in June. This check of our Year 1 pupils is designed to measure the success of the phonics teaching in the school. Under the expert leadership of Mrs Parkinson we have seen the standard improve each year and we are keen that this should continue. The daily teaching of phonics can be helpfully reinforced at home and we are pleased that so many parents are taking the time to do this with their children.

To this end we have offered phonics meetings for parents and we also provide ideas about how to help and support the development of phonics at home through the topic guides and through additional activities to complete at home, if necessary.



GOAL C: PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, BEHAVIOUR & WELFARE

The Pupil's Section in the last newsletter provides evidence that we are working hard to make sure we are engaging pupils in the school improvement cycle and taking actions as a result of their feedback. Since returning from the Easter break week we have introduced a range of activities for the children to access at lunchtimes as a direct result of the School Council feedback. It has been lovely to watch groups of children collaborating successfully in the 'Game of the Week' which has given them the opportunity to play something different and new. Fundraising has also allowed us to purchase some giant Jenga and a large Connect 4 game. Ensuring children are happy and occupied helps us to continue to improve personal development, behaviour and welfare. Staff well-being is also monitored annually and in the next few weeks the whole staff will be invited to complete a well-being survey. The results of this survey are analysed and compared to findings from previous years to help to maintain a happy and motivated workforce.

GOAL D: PUPIL OUTCOMES

Now is the time when many of the statutory assessments have started. Year 2 pupils will be completing Reading, Maths and Spelling, Grammar and Punctuation tests by the end of this half term. Last week at the staff meeting, teachers were asked to look carefully at pupil progress data for their classes and they also looked across the year groups to see the standards that children are attaining as they progress through the school. Writing assessment provides an interesting challenge for us and we are pleased to note significant progress in the way children are making use of writing success criteria. It is clear to see how strong teaching in Foundation Stage and Year 1 leads to the pleasing progress so many children are making as they near the end of their time in Year 2.





8. MISCELLANEOUS

Cleaning Operatives Vacancies

We have vacancies for cleaning operatives to join the team at John Hampden School. The hours of work are from 3.00—7.00 pm.


Outside Learning Area
