




In 2017, the championships began and ended in July, making the gap between the tournament and the French Open a little longer. Usually, there is no play on the 'Middle Sunday', however rain sometimes forces play on this day. Wimbledon's Centre Court has been fitted with a moving roof which can be closed over the court. The main show courts, Centre Court and No. 1 Court, are normally used for only two weeks per year, but play can go into a third week if there has been lots of rain. The other 17 courts are used for other events hosted by the club.
