

Introductory Activity



There are four basic types of sentence in the English language.



In this lesson we will concentrate on Questions and Commands.



Questions:

- Questions ask something.
- They start with a capital letter and finish with a question mark.
- They can be answered.
- They include a question word e.g. what, where, how, when, why, which, who, does, is, should...

How much is it?



What is behind the sofa?



When does the film finish?



How do you like your eggs in the morning?



Command:

- A command is an order giving someone an instruction or telling them to do something.
- It usually begins with an imperative bossy verb e.g. get, do, switch, tidy...
- It can be negative e.g. 'Don't stop!'
- It can end with either a full stop or an exclamation mark.

Get in the bath.



Get out of here!



Eat your sprouts.



Take off your shoes and place them under the bench.





The way something is read gives us a big clue to what type of sentence it is.

- 1. Hold your answer card so that you have your 'Question' card in your right hand and your 'Command' card in your left hand.
- 2. Close your eyes so you can really concentrate on your teacher reading out the sentences on the following slide.
- 3. Hold up the card that matches whether you think the sentence is a question or a command.
- 4. Check the answer were you right?
