Every child would have attended, wearing their summer clothes, and our Year 2 parents would have been invited to join us in the celebration. Whilst we are obviously disappointed when things don't turn out the way we had planned, such disappointments test our resilience and we can choose how we respond. At John Hampden our value of perseverance is one which we allude to regularly —it is easy not to start or to give up when the going gets tough, but you are a much stronger learner if you put some effort in and try to keep going. In these difficult times you may well have been inspired by watching the news and seeing numerous examples of resilience and perseverance. The perfect example is Captain (honorary colonel) Tom Moore who has been an inspiration to us all. His mantra 'Tomorrow will be a good day' is one that should resonate loudly with us at this time if we are to keep positive. It is also one which could be useful when reflecting on home learning. I have seen numerous examples of excellent home learning and some beautiful end results and the whole staff join in congratulating you and your children when things go really well and there is something to be very proud of as a result. However, we recognise that it can be hard work to encourage and motivate children when they are away from their peers, their teaching staff and their regular learning environment. Mrs King, our leader for developing 'Growth Mindsets' at the school has put together some information and some useful online resources which may just help if learning at home is proving tricky. Learning behaviours are basically some of our school values—perseverance, independence, reflection, respect but good listening is key.

If you praise and reinforce these things you may well find beautiful end products are the result. Our mantra at school is 'effort leads to success'. Remember, if you are struggling we are here to help and you can email or phone us if you need to. Tomorrow will be a good day!

2. IMPORTANT MESSAGES

Growth Mindset

During these unusual times of home learning the children are in a very different learning environment. They don't have their usual classroom support network of friends, peers, the teacher and teaching assistant to support them. Whilst learning at home with 1:1 support from a parent can be fantastic, it can also be very challenging for all involved. You may be finding your child more inclined to give up or lack the motivation to persevere. It might be helpful to remind them of our John Hampden School 'Great Learning Adventure'. At school, we remind the children that it is perfectly



normal to find things difficult and that we can take a 'power boost' along the way (asking for help, trying another way, persevering when it is difficult, saying to yourself 'I can't do it yet'). We will all find things challenging along the way but this is an important part of learning and everyone finds things difficult to begin with. We are all on a learning adventure at the moment as we are all learning to cope with a new way of working and living.

It is important to praise the effort involved in achieving a result, not just the end result. Specific praise, rather than 'well done' or 'good boy/girl' is very powerful at boosting the child's confidence. 'Wow! You have tried so hard to keep your handwriting neat. Well done'

'I can see you have tried very hard to learn those spellings'

'That was a tricky piece of maths, but you stuck at it.'

'I am really impressed by how you persevered with.....'
