1. Message from Mrs Barnes

As we reach the end of the first term of this academic year, it is a good opportunity to reflect on what we have achieved since September. Whilst watching the children in their Christmas performances, I saw our core values of perseverance and collaboration shining through. The children have all worked hard during the term and I hope they are beginning to recognise that effort really does lead to success. Many of the 'Over & Above' certificates handed out so far are rewarding children for their continued effort and their ability to uphold the behaviour expecatations and the values we believe are so important for effective learning. I hope all our pupils will return in the New Year ready to build on the impressive start they have made.

The Autumn Term, in many ways, has brought a little more normality to schooling than we have experienced in recent years and I am so pleased that we have been able to open our doors to parents on a few occasions to allow you to watch your children perform. The usual Christmas activities and excitement have been a feature of the last few weeks and the children have obviously responded with enjoyment.

Now, as we head towards a much needed break, I would like to thank you for your support as we continue to work in a global pandemic. We have experienced cases of Covid within the school during the term and, for everyone's safety, we have had to ask some parents to organise PCR testing for their children on occasions—thank you for your understanding. As you are aware, a mobile testing unit came to the school last week to conduct PCR tests with one class and the staff associated with it. Findings from this testing suggested that no further action was required, which is reassuring to note. I would encourage you to complete a lateral flow test on your child on Tuesday 4th January so we start the new year at school in a safe way, following all the Christmas celebrations and mingling.

My thanks to the Friends of John Hampden and the Governors for their support this term. We are grateful to all of them who have given their time voluntarily to help the school.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the dedication and commitment of the staff who work at John Hampden—I couldn't ask for a better team and their effort and resilience is amazing. We will be saying goodbye to two members of this team today - Mrs Llewellyn (Teacher) and Mrs Ivory (Midday Supervisor and Playworker) - we wish them both well for the future.

P.E. AT SCHOOL

4. PUPIL'S SECTION

We thought you might like to read some comments from the children about their experience of performing in front of an adult audience in the Christmas productions

His favourite song was 'Three Kings were Riding'. Bertie was a Shepherd and her special job was to say "It's always the same" and "we've brought some lambs for him". She liked the dance and her favourite song was 'Ring out the Bells'. She liked it when her parents came to watch.

In Squirrels class, Alma felt really nervous on the first performance but she was happy on the second performance and able to say her lines out loud to the audience. She had great fun. Harry was very excited about being Joseph and the second day was extra excited! He was really proud to be Joseph. It was his favourite part.

In Badgers class, Jacob liked singing the songs and doing his lines and his dance and Kelsey liked the dancing and it made her feel happy.

In Herons class, Stephanie liked being up on the stage saying her lines as a Narrator in front of an audience because she's never done anything like that before. Georgie liked her role as a Narrator because she learnt how to say her lines loudly and it has helped her confidence. She liked the dancing too.

In Firecrests class, Yash was King Herod. He was nervous to start but he was so happy when he leant his lines and said them loudly and clearly. He felt proud and others were proud of him too. Maya was a Shepherd and she was nervous to start with but then it was a lot of fun and she had a nice time and is was great for her Mum and Dad to see it.

In Red Kites class, Ella enjoyed saying her lines as a Narrator in the play. She also liked dressing up in her costume. Reggie really liked playing the part of Joseph in the performance. It was fun to knock at the Inn Keepers doors. He also enjoyed singing to the families.
