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MILSSAGE FROM MIRS DARNES

Apologies for having to cancel the 'Supporting Success at School' evening for parents on Tuesday 22nd January. The snowy weather was to blame but the event has been re-scheduled for Tuesday 29th January instead—same time, same place!

Despite having a National Curriculum which directs the content of what should be taught to children at this stage of their education, we are given the freedom to choose how we feel it is best to deliver this content. We have found that some topics are universally popular with infant aged pupils whilst at other times we take account of particular interests of the children to plan something new. Our teachers work very hard to keep the learning opportunities relevant and interesting for the children so they are motivated and engaged in their learning.

At The John Hampden School Wendover we try hard to present the content as a linked curriculum whenever possible. This means we choose topics which enable aspects of different subjects to be taught in a meaningful way to the children. So, rather than having a history lesson each week we may choose to block the teaching of this subject into a specific topic. At other times we may choose to have specific enrichment days or weeks to focus attention on a particular subject or a particular theme. So far this academic year we have enjoyed a fortnight of Health and Safety. 'Discovery Week' is coming up soon where the children will be investigating mathematically and scientifically. There will also be a focus on thinking skills linked to philosophy (P4C) and Growth Mindsets.

When we come back after the half term break, Mrs Collins and Mrs Llewellyn have planned an exciting Arts Week that will involve the children creating art work linked to a specific theme. This will be enhanced with music, drama and poetry. Later on in the year there will also be World Weeks to look forward to.

Whenever possible we invite visitors into school or we plan trips to enhance the learning experiences. Sometimes we ask the children to come to school wearing costumes to make their learning more memorable. With this is mind I would like to draw your attention to World Book Day which we will be celebrating on Friday 1st March. Every year we ask the children to dress up and this year we are asking everyone to come dressed as their favourite character from a book. We will be celebrating our love of books by providing a range of activities throughout the day including sharing books with Wendover Junior School children.

Finally, can I remind parents/carers that we try hard to advertise our open door policy, encouraging you to come into school and speak to us if you have any concerns, questions or worries. Please do approach the school first rather than using Facebook or other social media channels—we are here to help and we are best placed to provide you with the answers that you may need.

2. GOVERNOR SECTION

The John Hampden School is very much a community. The opinion of every member of the School is respected, including, of course, the pupils'. This attitude is echoed in the Government's Statutory Guidance which has 'due regard' to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. This gives '...a child who is capable of forming his or her own views the right to express those views freely in all matters affecting the child'.

As History Governor I had this responsibility in mind when I recently met nine representatives of the three Year Two classes to hear what they thought of the topic of Roald Dahl, whose life and work they had studied as part of the History syllabus.

They each spoke well about different elements of Dahl's life including his love of chocolate, the fact that he was bullied at Repton School, and his service in the RAF. They clearly understood that these were some of the incidents which could have had an influence on his work.

Every child shared their thoughts about a particular book and even the less outgoing children showed great enthusiasm for their chosen story. There was a wide range of favourites and everyone else listened attentively as each pupil said which book they liked and why. Following on from their work on 'The Big Friendly Giant' the children had made dream jars and each explained why they'd chosen the subjects that they had.

Dahlicious Day, when they'd come to school dressed as a favourite character, was another high spot of the topic, sparking great enthusiasm.

It was clear that the children had been inspired by their subject and because of the close relationship between Dahl and his illustrator Quentin Blake it had led to some very exciting art work, which I saw when three of the representatives showed me the displays of dream jars in their class rooms. I even had a sneak preview of the calendars which they'd made and which lucky parents received at the end of last term.

It was clear from everything I heard and saw during my visit that the topic of Roald Dahl is one which is very engaging to the pupils at John Hampden and which they wanted to share with me.

Without exception they chose Dahlicious Day as the favourite event in school, only surpassed by the visit to the Roald Dahl Gallery at the Bucks County Museum.

It would be sad to think that if parents' voluntary contributions decrease, as Mrs Barnes wrote in the first newsletter of 2019, there is a real risk that enriching experiences, like this visit, will no longer be viable. This would make our children's experience the poorer.

Fortunately, at the moment, the Pupil Voice at John Hampden is thoughtful, enthusiastic and articulate; long may it continue.

3. IMPORTANT MESSAGES

School Times

This is a polite reminder that children should arrive at school between 8.45a.m. and 8.55a.m. each day. We have a number of children who are either arriving very early or after 8.55a.m. It is a shame that those children arriving late are often missing the important first instructions of the morning. Please try to ensure your child arrives on time. The black security gate is locked promptly at 8.55am so if your child is late please accompany them to the main entrance where we will let them into the school and ask you to complete the late arrivals sheet.

Scooters and Bicycles

Please note, scooters and bicycles left at school are left entirely at the owner's risk. John Hampden School accepts no liability for any loss or damage from any cause whatsoever. It really helps if bicycles and scooters are clearly named and we are happy for them to be padlocked to the fence for extra security if you wish. Siblings from Wendover Junior School should not leave their scooters or bikes on our premises.

Attendance Letters

Just a reminder that, as mentioned in the attendance letter, one day is two sessions so if your child has had one day off it will be recorded as two sessions absence i.e. morning and afternoon.

Scroll of Honour Badges

Our behaviour initiative, which allows any pupil in the school to be nominated by an adult for demonstrating excellent behaviour, appears to be working well. Every child who is nominated has their name included on the Scroll of Honour and is asked to stand up in front of the rest of the school during Merit Assembly on Friday. They are given a yellow 'Spotted for Something Special' badge which they can wear for one week. We are asking for your support in ensuring the badges are returned to school on the following Thursday. This way we can make sure they can be passed to the next set of children who are nominated. We only have a limited supply of the badges and others will be really disappointed if they don't get a badge when it is their special moment. Thank you for your support.

Jewellery

Please remember that children should not be wearing any jewellery to school. Children with pierced ears should definitely have their earnings removed on P.E. days or be provided with tape to cover the studs if they cannot be removed yet. This is for health and safety reasons as earnings can easily get caught up as children get changed for P.E.

Parents Using Staff Car Park

Please can we ask, once again, that parents/carers do not use the staff car park at any time unless a specific arrangement has been made with the school.

Request from the Early Years Class

Now our youngest children are happily settled into Crickets Class we have become aware that we are short of small sized underwear, socks, tights and trousers. If you have any spares that you would be happy to donate to the school we would be pleased to accept them either directly to the Early Years Classroom or via the school office. Thank you

<u>Supervision</u>

Please can we remind parents/carers to supervise children vigilantly before and after school. There have been a number of accidents just outside the school grounds as children have climbed on bollards, fences etc. Also please join us in reminding your child to dismount their cycle or scooter as soon as they enter the school grounds.

Ill health

Please make sure your children are fully recovered from any illness that has kept them away from school before sending them back. This way we prevent illness from spreading.

4. Curriculum

At The John Hampden School Wendover we use the 'Talk 4 Writing' approach to develop proficiency and skill in writing. This involves the children becoming very familiar with particular genres of writing through verbal retelling which allows them to memorise the appropriate structure and features. They then move on to imitating the style before innovating an alternative, and finally inventing their very own version. This half term the genre they are focusing on is 'recount' writing. Initially the children in KS1 were asked to write their own recount (a cold task) so teachers could identify what they already know about the genre and what they need to be taught. At the end of this half term, following lots of targeted teaching, the children are asked to write another invented recount (a hot task) where they are expected to demonstrate as many of the features of this particular genre as they can. The children are supported by having success criteria grids to refer to which remind them of what to include and which they can use to self-assess their writing.

We are a few weeks into this particular genre of writing and we are already seeing some impressive results being produced.

We thought you might like to read some examples from each year group:

Foundation Stage

5. PUPIL'S SECTION

Growth Mindset

We are focussing on achieving our goals in school at the moment. We are encouraging the children to set goals that they can achieve in school and outside. At a time when many people have set New Year's resolutions it is a great time to reflect on how we can use a 'Growth Mindset' to help us achieve what we have set out to do.

In assembly last week I talked to the children about persevering when things become difficult. I told them the story of a boy who had persisted at learning to hoola hoop, practising every day until he could do it and taking advice from his friends on how he could be successful. I read the children the story 'Giraffes Can't Dance' and we talked about how the Giraffe eventually learnt to dance by finding new ways to tackle his problem and persevering. Both stories highlighted that we can overcome difficulties if we keep persevering. I encouraged the children to think about how making mistakes is proof that we are trying and learning. We thought about what we could say to someone who was struggling to encourage them to achieve their aim. Below are some of the comments from the children.

7. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

We aim to keep you fully informed of our actions linked to the school improvement plan. Since the last newsletter we have made progress linked to the actions outlined below:

GOAL A: LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

Some of the INSET day at the beginning of January was devoted to exploring our vision for learning outside the classroom. We have worked hard over the years to develop a wonderful outside learning environment for our Foundation Stage children and the new Nursery has a great outside classroom attached to the building and marvellous play equipment in the area to the front of the building. It is now time to focus our attention on providing something of similar quality for our KS1 pupils with age appropriate opportunities for outside learning. Plans and ideas have been formulated by the KS1 year group teams and we are waiting for acceptable quotes before beginning a phased project. The fundraising initiatives, including all FJH fundraising, will be used to finance the project which will

be of benefit to all pupils in the school.



GOAL B: TEACHING, LEARNING &



We have devoted the last three staff meetings to making further improvements to the planning for, and delivery of the writing genre for this half term. Mrs Parkinson, our English co-ordinator, has provided clear and effective leadership to ensure continuity and progression relating to the genre of 'recount' writing across the school. Year group teams have worked together closely to ensure equality of opportunity for children in FS, Y1 and Y2. This is another example of how we continue to strive for the highest standards.

GOAL C: PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, BEHAVIOUR



Parents recently received a letter informing them of their child's attendance figure for Autumn 2018. Analysis of whole school data tells us that 87 children (33%) had 100% attendance and 98% of children had an attendance percentage of over 80%. 78% had

above 95% attendance (the expected figure)

Punctuality data was also analysed. As a rule, punctuality is very good but we do have a small number of families who are regularly arriving later then 8.55am. We will continue to monitor attendance and punctuality regularly.

We have introduced a new set of lunchtime monitors and Play Pals who are responsible for ensuring all children have someone they recognise who can help and support them lunchtime. Our monitors wear special tabards or bright red caps so they can be easily identified and their photos are proudly displayed in the corridor. We are keen to ensure our pupils are given these types of roles of responsibility and there are further opportunities e.g. School Council representatives who complement the work of the Class Council.

GOAL D: PUPIL OUTCOMES

Following the assessment week at the end of last term, internal data has now been analysed to identify differences in performance between the various 'groups' in the school. This includes comparing performance in a range of ways e.g. gender, term of birth etc. This forensic analysis enables us to spot trends and to set performance targets for the end of the academic year. The results of this data analysis are shared within the Senior Leadership Team, with governors and with teaching staff.

Other data from the DfE and from the Local Authority has also recently been released and all of this information helps to build a picture of performance over time.



8. MISCELLANEOUS
