1. Message from Mrs Barnes

As we reach the end of the first half of the Spring Term we are already looking forward to what the next half will bring. Learning Review Meetings for Early Years & Foundation Stage and KS1 pupils have been included in the school calendar and we have noted previous feedback which appeared to show parents would value having more notice of their appointment time. To this end we have sent home the dates and associated times for these meetings. We have asked that the reply slips be returned to school by Friday 14th February, so we will be able to organise appointments and inform you of your time slot as soon as we return after the holiday. The meetings are scheduled to take place on Wednesday 11th March and Thursday 12th March. Teachers try very hard to adhere to the ten minute time allocations. If issues arise during the meeting that need further discussion, it may be more appropriate to make another mutually convenient appointment time, as others are affected when appointments overrun. To give children the opportunity to share their work with you, following your meeting with the class teacher, we would like to invite you into school at 2.45pm on Friday 13th March.

Opportunities for parents/carers to meet with the class teacher to discuss pupil progress occur twice during the academic year but we advertise an 'open door' policy so if parents/carers have a concern about any aspect of the school at any other time we are happy to find a mutually convenient time to talk to you. Mrs Parkinson and I are also available if you feel you need to contact us about an issue too. Our school aims to be fair, open and honest when dealing with any concern or complaint and to resolve it through open dialogue and mutual understanding. It is not appropriate to publicise any concerns you may have on social networking sites. Please speak, or write, to someone at the school at your earliest convenience, rather than using any other means. Concerns or complaints should not be raised with individual governors. They have no power to act on an individual basis and it may prevent them from considering a formal complaint in the future. The school considers any concerns very seriously and most problems can be resolved following discussion and a shared understanding of the issues. Staff at the school are here to help you but obviously we will not tolerate physical or verbal abuse when attempting to deal with issues that are brought to our attention.

2. GOVERNOR SECTION

In this newsletter I'd like to focus on PSHE. You'd be forgiven if you weren't familiar with what PSHE is but it's one of the most important aspects of your child's learning. In short, Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) education supports the development of physically, emotionally and socially healthy young people, equipped to live productive and responsible lives.

Few schools dedicate the time John Hampden does to PSHE and it's evidence of how seriously it takes its pupils' well-being. Not only is PSHE incorporated into the curriculum, it also supports the school's values and forms part of the School Development Plan.

A great example of PSHE in action are the Health and Safety weeks in the first term. Some of the activities during these weeks – to name but a few - include creating a healthy meal, daily 5-minute runs, Zumba, a visit from a police constable, learning about fire safety, and e-safety. It's difficult to do justice to the amount of work that goes in to organising these, as well as catering to the different age groups, but the children clearly enjoy them and benefit tremendously.

You're also hopefully aware of the year 2019/20 being the Year of Kindness, and this has formed a special topic for the whole school. Many of the activities have been pupil-led, and you'll see displays made by the children all around the school noting acts of kindness. There have also been special assemblies with a focus on Kindness, there was International Kindness Day in November, and Circle Time has been used as an opportunity to talk about the topic (and demonstrate listening skills and show respect for each other's views).

Another important aspect of PSHE that you'll likely be familiar with are the transition arrangements for children entering and leaving the school, especially during for the first few weeks of the autumn term and the last few weeks of the summer term. The school takes great care to ensure transitions are handled with care so pupils feel fully prepared and can embark on their new journeys with minimum disruption.

As the governor responsible for monitoring PSHE, I've been incredibly impressed by how John Hampden delivers this subject. The staff are very passionate about it and put a lot of time and effort in to ensuring its delivered consistently across the school. A lot of this work goes unnoticed but, by using PSHE to help remove barriers to learning, such as bullying or low self-esteem, the staff enable pupils to develop the understanding and skills needed to really thrive as individuals, family members and members of society.

Cycling from Aleppo to Wendover



You may be aware that Wendover is welcoming a Syrian family, refugees from the war in their country. Last weekend twenty teams of 8 people cycled the equivalent of 2,500 miles, the distance from Syria to Wendover, on static bikes. We are very proud of the eight staff and governors from John Hampden who formed our team—each cycled for an hour last Sunday. Fantastic effort by all!

4. Curriculum

This week has been Discovery Week for the children at John Hampden School. This means the opportunity to plan and carry out investigations linked to their topics in maths and science. Investigation is very much part of the curriculum and during Discovery Week we really celebrate this.

In science children from Reception Stage to Year 2 have been using their planning, reasoning and investigative skills.

In Foundation Stage the children have been learning about movement, floating and sinking. They have investigated dancing, raisins, sinking satsumas and how to turn cream into butter!

Year 1 have been experimenting with different materials and discovering which material would be best for a new roof for Ted!

In Year 2 the children have been looking at the changing states of materials. They have been dissolving, melting, predicting, observing and recording.

The results are in and the conclusion is it really has been fun!

We thought you might like to read some of the comments the children said following Discovery week:-

Arthur in Badgers said "I found out that the cone won't balance on the pointy edge prism. It needs a flat face"

Jack in Badgers said "I've discovered that 2 cylinders under a flat cuboid and a square based pyramid can stack even though cylinders can roll"

Freja in Squirrels said "When I make a tower I had to make sure the cubes were straight to make it secure"

Bertie in Squirrels said "I realised that when we put the cylinders at the bottom of the tower it wasn't stable because they were curved"

Leo in Hedgehogs said "I've discovered that triangles can be different sizes and shapes but they always have 3 sides and 3 corners"

Mabel in Hedgehogs said "I liked seeing how many vertices they had. The triangles all had 3 but they looked different. Some were taller and the edges were longer"

April from Honeybees said "I really liked being a scientist, especially when we shook the cream and it turned into butter!"

Eloise from Squirrels said "I felt like a real scientist because we wore the white lab coats to investigate a suitable roof for Teddie's house. The paper and fabric were not suitable because the water came through and got Teddy wet".

Tyler from Squirrels said "The investigation was really exciting because we had to find a suitable roof for Teddy. I worked with a partner which was fun because we worked as a team. Our investigation showed that the bubble wrap and the tin foil was the strongest roof. Teddy didn't get wet".

Edward from Badgers said "I liked it because the metal was strong and waterproof and the plastic bubble wrap was waterproof because it didn't let the water through. I learnt from the paper towel that it took time to let the water inside the cup but in the end it did go through"

Kaveah from Herons said "I liked making the bath bomb out of different materials and I enjoyed watching them change. It fizzed then disappeared".


Michael from Red Kites said "It was really exciting to make bath bombs because they are fun to have in the bath and now I know how to make them".

7. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

We aim to keep you fully informed of our actions linked to the school improvement plan. Since the last newsletter we have made progress linked to the actions outlined below:

GOAL A: QUALITY OF EDUCATION

<u>Assessment We</u>ek

This week the children have been busy providing us with further evidence of what they have learned since the last 'Assessment Week' at the end of the Autumn Term. The children complete a range of tasks and activities to help teachers confirm their judgements about progress and attainment in the core subjects. Assessment is an on-going process in our school but these special weeks give our staff and pupils the opportunity to spend slightly longer gathering more evidence to confirm their judgements. Learning Review meetings take place during the week beginning 9th March. Teachers will share with you, their observations and assessments of your child, at this time. They will also hand you a sheet outlining some targets which could be worked on at home as well as in school.

During the first half of the Spring Term, the Early Years class have taken every opportunity to get engaged in new learning. Foundation Stage pupils have been inspired by their topic of 'Explorer, Explorer' and so much good learning has taken place. Year One have been inspired by their topic work and have completed numerous investigations. Year Two have found Samuel Pepys buried treasure in the school grounds which led to them learning so much about the Great Fire of London.

GOAL B: BEHAVIOUR & ATTITUDES

The School Council has met. The Council now has three new members from the Foundation Stage classes, chosen by their classmates. The focus for their discussion this time linked to our 'Year of Kindness' and they made good suggestions about how to make further improvements in order to create an even more positive and respectful culture in the school.

The whole school has spent this week developing thinking skills in Science and Maths activities and learnt more about Growth Mindsets as part of Discovery Week.

GOAL D: LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

We continue to be pleased with the excellent response from pupils to the 'Scroll of Honour' initiative. We are consistently noticing more children taking the initiative to offer help to others or to tidy up or to demonstrate the school values in action without any prompting. We are delighted that a whole range of adults in the school spot this type of behaviour and we hope that this will further enhance the ethos of kindness and respect for people and property whilst also celebrating the success of those who demonstrate our core values and our Golden Rules.

Our recent Mathematics Curriculum Evening provided parents/carers with the opportunity to learn how to support mathematical development at home.

We are pleased to have appointed Mrs Ridge to take on the role of Finance Manager at John Hampden. She began work on Monday 3rd February. As we approach the end of the financial year for the school, we are waiting to discover how much funding we will receive for 2020-2021. Budget setting activities are underway and we look likely to have reduced our deficit situation further by our continuing austerity measures and successful cost saving actions. We are also benefiting from successful fundraising and profitable collaborations.

Projects are underway linked to language development and reading. These are collaborative projects with different schools, the Local Authority and research institutions. Our commitment to working with others is proving beneficial for pupils at John Hampden.



'Please Let Us Through'

It is probably little consolation to you that your school is not the only one that has issues with parking at the start and end of the school day.

As has been proved recently, inconsiderate parking can cause life-threatening delays to emergency service vehicles that are trying to reach a school during these times.

Here at Bucks Fire & Rescue Service, we are occasionally asked to help a school to tackle their parking issues.

While we are keen to help if we can, please be aware that we have no powers of enforcement when it comes to parking.

We can only suggest, usually with signs on lampposts, or fliers on windscreens (a last resort) that people consider emergency vehicles when parking.

Your school may have tried the 'usual' methods to tackle the parking issue; letters in school newsletters, or direct to parents, etc. Other areas have tried different approaches; pupils talking to errant drivers, even temporary road closures, with varied levels of success.

We are pleased to be working with the Bucks County Council Healthy Travel Team, looking at ways that might help all schools deal with this issue. Unfortunately, there is not one 'fix' that will work for all schools, but if we can offer you a range of measures that you can take, hopefully you can find one or more that work for your school.
