### 1. Message from Mrs Barnes

I, along with everyone else in the country, am eagerly awaiting the promised update from Government this weekend. At this point in time, I genuinely know no more than you regarding the plan for re-opening schools but there is a genuine desire from all at John Hampden to welcome our pupils back when it is deemed the time is right. I completely understand the anxiety that all the current uncertainties bring and you probably have lots of questions about how things will be when a reopening date is announced. I hope you will trust us to follow the guidance we are given to ensure everyone remains safe and we will always work with the best interests of everyone within our school community in mind. If everything was 'normal' right now we would be thinking about the transition to Year 3 for our oldest pupils, transition into the school for our brand new pupils and transition between classes for those who will remain with us. Lock down doesn't stop us thinking about this—please be assured that, at John Hampden, we always put a huge amount of effort into the transition process and, come what may, this year will be no different. We may not be able to do what we normally do but we will be creative in ensuring everyone feels as prepared as possible for what is to come.

Please note, for the small number of children who need to attend school at the moment, there will be another Premier Sport provision over the half term holiday based at John Hampden, but the school will be closed on Friday 8th May and Monday 25th May—the two Bank Holidays. A letter will be issued to relevant families regarding arrangements for securing a school place during the half-term holiday.


